## THE CRIMINAL ACT OF PROSTITUTION IN THE INDONESIAN CRIMINAL LAW SYSTEM

The times have changed the standardization of human life. Advances in technology, modernization, and globalization have led to patterns of behavior that deviate from laws and norms. One form of such deviation is prostitution. Prostitution can occur in any country, and Indonesia is no exception.
